Terrible Error #1 - Not Researching The Company

Are you making the BIGGEST IT job interview mistake? I see developers do this all the time...

They don't research the company. They enter the interview prepared to talk about themself, thinking it's all about them.

Wrong!

The interview is not about you - it's about the company.

So, ask yourself the following questions:

- What does the company need right now?
- What does the company excel at?
- What are its major weaknesses?
- How can I help the company?

"But Tom!" you say. "I don't know the answer to these questions. I'm not an employee of the company... "

Of course you're not! That's why you have to do research. Research will give you answers to these questions.

So before your next English IT interview, spend 2-4 hours (Yes, I said 2-4 hours. Do you want the job or not?) doing the following steps:

- Browse the company's website
- Watch a few videos on their YouTube channel
- Ask a client how they like their service/product
- Talk to someone on LinkedIn who works for that company
- Read the company's publications (white paper, ebook, reports, etc.)



To summarize, researching the company demonstrates that you are ambitious and intelligent.

Your research shows that you can provide value to them.

The company will have a good impression of you.

And you are more likely to get the job.



Terrible Error #2 - Forgetting to Use Numbers

Let's play a game. It's called "Find What's Wrong".

Find what's wrong in this common interview answer from developers:

"I helped clients build and launch their new applications."

Do you know what's wrong? There are ZERO (0) numbers!

That's a big problem - especially in IT.

To the company, this statement tells them nothing about you, the developer.

It's very vague.

It doesn't give good data.

It doesn't tell them how you can help the company advance.

"But Tom," you say, "how can I make this statement better? I don't know how to do that..."

First, you use NUMBERS.

Answer these questions:

- How many clients did you help?
- How long did it take you to build and launch their new applications?



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Now, you have a better statement:

"I helped 3 clients build and launch new applications within 5 months."

But you can still improve this statement! Now, you need to be SPECIFIC.

Answer these questions:

- How did you help clients?
- What type of applications did you launch?
- Did you program it all yourself? Or did you manage a team?

Now, you have a GREAT statement:

"I helped 3 clients build and launch new Android mobile applications within 5 months by leading a team of 6 senior and junior software engineers."

The company now knows EXACTLY how you can help them!



Terrible Error #3 - Not Practicing

You forgot the English word.

You were in an English interview.

It was going great... until you forgot what to say.

How could you forget such a simple, standard word?

The reason is pressure.

You will feel a LOT of pressure in your English IT interviews.

Why?

An interview is an important event.

An English interview with an international IT company is an opportunity of a lifetime!

So it is completely natural to feel nervous and pressured.

The problem is what will happen if you're not prepared:

- You won't remember common words and phrases
- Your answers will become very plain and short
- You will make a terrible impression

In short, you will fail your English interview.



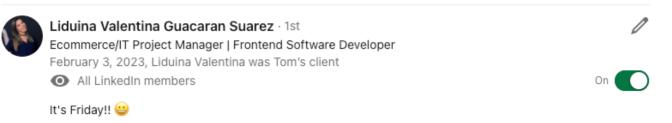
UNLESS... you practice.

If you practice, you will:

- Memorize specific English words and phrases to say
- Gain confidence in your number-oriented answers
- Make an extraordinary impression

If you practice, you will pass your English interview.

- 5. Speak each answer out loud in English.
- 6. Watch the video recording afterwards.
- 7. Take notes on how you can improve.
- 8. Repeat Steps 4-7.

You just have to practice.
